#### MINUTES OF REGULAR MEETING

#### February 13, 2020

The Weatherford College Board of Trustees met in regular session at 2:00 p.m., Thursday, February 13, 2020 in the Allene Strain Community Room of the Doss Student Center. Vice-Chair Sue Coody called the meeting to order. Other Trustees present were Elaine Carter, Secretary Lela Morris, Dr. Robert Marlett, and Dr. Trev Dixon. Judy McAnally and Chairman Mac Smith were absent. Bob Glenn, President of the Weatherford College Foundation Board, gave the invocation, and the Pledge of Allegiance was recited.

No one spoke in open forum.

President Tod Allen Farmer gave the following recognitions, employee notices, and an enrollment report:

- a. Recognitions:
  - Dr. Scott Tarnowieskyi, Kim Kelly, Lisa Martin, Julie Moeller, and Nick Pugh. Through their collective efforts, many WC students registered to vote for the first time, and many others updated their registration addresses.
  - Several of our trustees recently attended a ceremony at the beautiful Steinway Hall Fort Worth facility. Steinway & Sons flew in corporate executives from New York to officially recognize Weatherford College as an All-Steinway Institution. Weatherford College is only the 6th community college in Texas to receive this designation. WC beat universities like Baylor, Texas Tech, and the University of North Texas in the race to become All-Steinway Institutions. The impact on recruiting and institutional reputation has been immediate, and will continue to be profound. A plaque was presented officially designating Weatherford College as an All-Steinway Institution to the Weatherford College Board of Trustees.
  - The Weatherford College Foundation, Foundation President Bob Glenn and all of the generous donors, for recently passing the \$10 million dollar mark in net assets. Foundation assets went from 8.6 million in December 2018 to 10.3 million in December 2019, a gain of 1.7 million dollars.
  - Weatherford College athletic teams:
    Women's basketball has a 20-4 overall record and an 8-2 conference record, men's basketball is 15-10 overall, and 3-6 in conference. Baseball is 7-1 and nationally ranked at 17th in the nation, and softball remains solid at 4-2.

#### President's Report

Several former Coyotes recently competed in the Fort Worth Stock Show and Rodeo. WC rodeo alumnus Martha Angelone won 8 thousand dollars last Saturday night at the finals, meanwhile, current rodeo tie down roper Thane Lockhart was the champion at the San Antonio Stock Show and Rodeo. The Coyote Rodeo team is positioning for another strong showing at the College National Finals Rodeo in Casper, Wyoming this summer.

b. Employment Notices -

President Farmer announced that a special ceremony for Myrlan Coleman would be coming later in the spring.

c. Enrollment Update -

As of the Spring 2020 semester census date, Weatherford College showed a system-wide spring enrollment of 5,523 students. This is a slight decrease of 375 students year-to-date primarily resulting from the change in technical dual credit policy. Overall, the Weatherford campus experienced minor enrollment increases, while all other campuses experienced minor enrollment decreases. Our enrollment management strategy is successfully resulting in the desired increased financial health.

The cash balance as of January 31, 2020 is \$46,351,315.12. This is an increase of \$793,308.90 from last year at January 31, 2019. The operating statement at January 31, 2020 indicates that total revenues collected are \$39,823,572 or 72.52% of budget. Total expenditures are \$26,588,176 or 48.43% of budget. According to the Weatherford College Purchasing Policy 16.21, Means of Disbursement, items determined to be obsolete, surplus or unusable shall be disposed of in one of the following manners: Disposal through public sale/auction, sale through bid process, sale to salvage companies, placement in trash, E-waste recycling. Authorization to dispose of items through the above means requires approval from the Board of Trustees before disposal. A total of two (2) vendors submitted competitive sealed bids for the requested Diagnostic Medical Ultrasound System. Mindray North America, and GE Medical have submitted bids that provide acceptable products that meet the specifications and offer the best value. Funds of \$50,000 have been allocated in the current 2019-2020 Carl D. Perkins Grant awards and \$10,000 in the Sonography budget for purchase of the items requested. After evaluation and review of the sealed bids, Dr. Peter Klimo, Program Director; Jeanie Hobbs, Director of Purchasing, and Deborah Terrell, Purchasing Department Buyer recommend award of this sealed bid not to exceed budget funds as follows: Mindray North America, \$59,750.00; total estimated cost \$59,750.00 *Attachment: SB-06-20 - Diagnostic Medical Ultrasound System with Trade-In* 

Ms. Morris made the motion to approve the Consent Agenda as presented. Dr. Marlett seconded and the motion carried unanimously.

Mr. Curlee gave an update on the progress of the Workforce and Emerging Technologies Building.

Dr. Andra Cantrell, Executive Vice President of Financial and Administrative Affairs proposed changes in facility names. Several members of the college community have expressed a desire to memorialize former agriculture instructor and rodeo coach Mike Brown on our Weatherford campus. The President's Cabinet has suggested naming the north wing of the first floor of the Academic Building the "Mike Brown Wing." This area now includes agriculture classes as well as displays celebrating agriculture and rodeo. This action would be in line with the board's two year waiting period for "tribute namings" in the college's naming/facilities planning policy (CL Local). In addition, the Cabinet has recommended renaming the Agriculture Building the "Police and Maintenance Building." Agriculture is no longer housed in this building, as the WC Police Department has moved into that space. As an

**SUBJECT:** Adoption of 2020-21 Tuition and Fees

**INFORMATION AND DISCUSSION:** Based upon the recommendation from the Tuition and Fees Advisory Committee, the administration is recommending an increase in tuition as well as increases in a number of fees. The administration, along with the assistance of the Tuition and Fees Advisory Committee, have researched and analyzed the current rates of Weatherford College and the other community colleges in the state of Texas. Factors reviewed during the analysis were:

- Anticipated budget expenditures for the 2020-21 budget including increases in faculty and staff.
- Anticipated 2020-21 state appropriations.
- Tuition and fee revenue supplements and other major revenue sources, primarily property taxes.

Changes in tuition and fees recommended by the Tuition and Fees Advisory Committee are listed below for the 2020-21 academic year:

- Tuition rates for in-district students would increase by \$6.00 per credit hour or 7%. Tuition for out-of-district students would increase by \$13.00 per credit hour or 9%. Tuition for out-of-district WCWC students would increase by \$9.00 per credit hour or 8%. Tuition for out-of-district ECG students would increase by \$12.00 per credit hour or 9%. Out-of-state rates would increase by \$18.00 per credit hour or 9%.
- The Institutional Enrichment Fee would increase from \$10.00 to \$15.00 per credit hour.
- The differential tuition rate for the Associate Degree Nursing program would increase by \$20.00 to \$80.00.
- An RN-to-BSN program differential tuition rate of \$80.00 would be added to match the ADN program differential tuition rate.
- Room and Board charges will increase by \$50.00 per semester for both 10-meal and 19-meal plans.
- Due to the conversion to the Colleague system, we will not be able to continue with our current payment plan provider—Nelnet. In the past, Nelnet handled all payment plans and charged our students the \$25.00 payment plan application fee. We have opted to handle the payment plans in-house through TouchNet, and by doing so we will charge and collect the \$25.00 application fee from the student.

• Parking permits for the summer semester would be simplified by increasing the fee to \$30.00 for the entire summer term instead of a separate \$20.00 fee for each summer semester.

A fixed cost per month for Fixed General Conditions as defined in sample AIA Document A133-2009 Standard Form of Agreement Between Owner and Construction Manager as Constructor shall be \$25,750.00. Percentage of Construction Cost fee for Construction Phase of Project shall be 2.5%. Negotiations will be entered into for the guaranteed maximum price.
